Welcome to all new readers of this Newsletter and may your association with our Club be a long and enjoyable one that provides not only a better understanding of your dog, but may it provide you with a greater circle of friends with a mutual interest.

The Newsletter is published every two months and distributed on the last training day of that month. Those people not able to attend that session may obtain their copy from the Secretary the following week. Those who aren't able to make normal training sessions can obtain their copy from the Training Supervisor if they advise her before the issuing date.

MICROCHIPS

Ever lost a pet, or worse had one stolen? I've had the misfortune of having one stolen. It was in fact the first Dobermann puppy I owned. One minute he was sucking a bone on the back verandah; 10 minutes later he was gone forever!

Desperation set in as I searched the property and neighbourhood. I spent many long months on that search and contacted schools, shopping centres, councils, Lost Dogs Homes, radio stations and newspapers, and enquired by phone or in person of any Dobermann found. Searching with me were the breeders, a breed Club of which I was not a member and the police. All to no avail.

It doesn't have to be a pure breed dog/puppy that thieves are after, they will take a variety of crossbreed dogs to inter-breed yet again and hopefully produce a fiercer fighting dog, a more aggressive guard dog, a better kangaroo or pig dog and so on. No-one is safe from this sort of theft as animals can be invited to go with the thieves voluntarily, drugged or mugged. If they want your dog they will get it!

The other problem that can occur is that you actually loose your dog. It may run off in fright, it may run off to chase something, it may go searching for a mate or it may just decide that the grass is greener on the other side of the fence.

Whatever the cause, how can your pet be DEFINITELY identified if found and taken to the Lost Dogs Home or to a vet if the latter becomes necessary?

Now this is possible if you have had your dog silicon chipped.

This system can permanently identify animals and offers a 24 hour, seven day a week traceback. Your council registration tag is only useful (if your dog is wearing it) during normal council hours.

It involves your veterinary surgeon inserting one of these silicon numbered chips under your dogs skin by means of an injection. Your dog does not have to be anaesthetised or have a local injection. It is done as simply as when you have your dog vaccinated, but this one injection of the chip lasts the dog's lifetime. Each chip is individually numbered so there is no way there can be confusion between the registrations.

People buying puppies can have the chip inserted when they go for their final injections. Adult dogs can be done at any stage and any age. When your dog has the chip inserted the vet will obtain the necessary details from you for the initial registration and he/she will submit these documents to the Central Registry in Springvale.

If found your dog is checked with a hand held scanner and the microchip number is displayed on the scanner's screen.

All veterinarians in the Geelong region are participating and have the necessary chips and registration forms available now, ready to go, and the ONE scanner for the area will be retained at the Lost Dogs Home in Moolap. The scanner itself is the most expensive piece of equipment in this whole operation.

The cost of initial insertion of the chip is \$28.00 and you pay \$7.00 for the first year's registration to be processed. The Central Registry will automatically send you out a renewal of registration request each year. Should you wish you can pay \$30.00 to cover you for five years or \$50.00 for life.

DATES TO REMEMBER

Next TUESDAY, October 2 is our Annual General Meeting that all members should attend. The committee for the 1990/91 period will be elected and this makes it an ideal time for you to meet them all together.

Members eligible to vote are displayed on a list inside the Clubhouse.

Members are reminded that the last regular Sunday training for the year will be on October 28. This day is also daylight saving changeover so remember to adjust your clocks accordingly. The following Sunday, November 4 will be our Two Way Fun Day between our club and Werribee on our home grounds. It doesn't matter whether you have trained for three weeks or three years, there will be a class for everyone. It is just like normal training sessions except that you do it individually against your own class members and those Werribee members in a similar class, AND you have a chance of winning a ribbon or two.

Your instructors will advise you of these prior to the event and you will have to complete and hand in an entry form one week prior to this with a fee of \$1.00. The money covers the cost of ribbons etc. for the day. Bring along your families and stay for lunch. The club barbecue is there for your use. The canteen will be open in the morning for normal sales only.

Normal training then resumes on the following WEDNESDAY evening, November 7.

Yet another date to mark on your calendars is NOVEMBER 11, our next Open Obedience Trial. ALL members should attend to either compete or spectate. EVERY-ONE should participate in the running ofthis trial, whether it be in helping prepare the grounds; supplying cakes and other produce for our stall; STEWARD-ING, food preparation in the kitchen or providing refreshments for the Judges and Stewards. An hour of every member's time shouldn't be too much to ask.

Think about your contribution to making this day a success.

The Schedule for this trial is included in this Newsletter as it will not appear in the K.C.C. Gazette. Remember, if you can help in any way, please see tisa and she will write your name on her list, (or whoever the Trial Secretary is).

The mosquito population appears to be alive and well yet again in the coastal areas and at the Club, so it is in your dog's best interests to give them the protection of Heart Worm tablets. REMEMBER, that before you start your dog on this lifetime regime you MUST have your dog blood tested by your veterinarian first. Most of your dogs will appreciate your sharing the Aeroguard with them too from now on. For those sensitive to aerosols you can either rub it on your hands first, or use one of the roll-on varieties. Even the heavier coated dogs can be bitten around the face and on the feet.



STRONGHEART - The German Shepherd

How many of you people have heard of STRONGHEART? (Especially those of you having Shepherds?

STRONGHEART was one of the most remarkable dogs that lived! Imported from Germany as Etzel von Oerengen he was chosen to become a dog movie star playing the leading role. The choice was made because of his outstanding looks, size, background and accomplishments. He excelled in the conformation ring, police work and military work as had done his forefathers. However, none is on record as having the intelligence of this magnificent dog.

After having been in America for just over a year this dog did a personal tour of the nation by popular demand.

Strongheart's owner had to be away for several months and he was left in the care of J.ALLEN BOONE who at that stage knew little about dogs at all, but had the capacity to learn about life and animals in general.

Through this period they grew together. STRONGHEART himself acting more as the Tutor, rather than man training him.

Following this period BOONE wrote a book dealing with 'kinship' between man and creatures of the universe. In this book he devotes the first 18 chapters to STRONGHEART, and I am sure non-Shepherd owners would enjoy reading of this dog's strengths and tremendous learning ability.

There are other chapters in that book which deal with a variety of other creatures, some which seem realistic and some that raise doubts, but it still is nevertheless a good read. The title of that book is called KINSHIP WITH ALL LIFE and is in our library here at the Club.

Another book which makes a mention of STRONGHEART is called 'PSYCHIC PETS' and this in itself is an excellent book that deals with the depths of perception that animals are capable of and is one which is well worth reading in order to enlarge our own perceptions of the animals we live with. This book is also held in our library and again I highly recommend it to those interested in behavioural studies.

(Originally I had thought that GREATHART Kennels had chosen their prefix after having read about Strongbeart. However, imagine my disappointment when I spoke with the owners and was told that Greathart had been a last gasp try for a prefix as everything else they had submitted had been rejected by the K.C.C.)

NEW LOCAL FACILTY

We have a ratio of approximately 85% registered and 15% unregistered dogs in our Club.

For those with registered dogs it was probably a simple enough task to find a suitable puppy. However, the actual conception of that puppy may not have been so easy.

Many bitches that are bred have no problems mating and conceiving and their owners are lucky. However, many planned matings require a lot of planning and veterinary visits. Bitches can have the same problems with conception as humans, and it takes just as much care and devotion to get them in whelp as it sometimes does for women to become pregnant.

Up until recently the only clinic in Victoria that was able to do complete testing of bitches and also store frozen dog semen was in LILYDALE and some of this testing required DAILY visits. So it has been a time consuming and expensive cost to many breeders.

Now at last we have a facility able to undertake all these procedures in Geelong which is a fabulous asset for us all. Congratulations must go to BELLARINE VETERINARY PRACTICE on their success in this field.

The services now offered there as a result of extensive research over the last four years into Artificial Breeding and Embryology are:

- 1. Semen Freezing Collection, freezing and storing of semen can be done on the premises. Frozen canine semen can be stored indefinitely.
- 2. Importation of Frozen Semen from the USA Arrangements can be made for quarantine procedures and collection
 of semen in the USA and subsequent shipment. On arrival the
 semen can be stored there until the bitch is ready to be inseminated. It is necessary to do progesterone assays to determine the
 best time to perform artificial insemination with frozen semen.
- 3. Progesterone Assays There are two laboratories that are geared up to measure progesterone levels in the bitches blood. This enables determination of the exact day of ovulation and therefore treat a lot of breeding problems e.g. infertility and small litter size as well as allowing insemination of bitches at the best time with either frozen, chilled or fresh semen.
- 4. Collection and Shipping of Chilled Semen Dog semen can be collected, extended with a special medium and
 then chilled. It is stored in a specially designed container and
 can then be transported anywhere in Australia or New Zealand to
 inseminate bitches. Normal conception rates and litter sizes can
 be obtained by this method and the semen can be stored for 48 hours.
- 5. Hormone Implants for Ancestrus (non cycling) Bitches They are involved in a research project with a Company that has developed GnRH implants that can be inserted under the bitches skin. Bitches will come into heat 5-7 days later and are then served in the normal manner.
