HORROR STORY

It was a seemingly innocent July evening. I was sitting at my desk near a window through which I could watch my two young bitches playing in the back yard. Their idea of playing is jumping on each other and chewing faces.

I was alerted by an ungodly screeching and looked up to see the dogs at each other's throats. What's this? My dogs NEVER fight!

(....

I ran out to pull them apart but found they were locket together! The Gordon bitch had twisted the Shepherd's choke chain around her lower teeth - behind the canines. She had panicked and flip-flopped around until the chain was so tight that they were stuck. When I looked at the Shepherd's face, her eyes were bulging and she could not breathe. I managed to calm the Gordon down and must have been screaming myself because my husband came running from the house to help.

Somehow the chain had to be cut but is wedges so tightly that the dogs could easily be injured. The first two tools my husband brought were completely useless. By that time the Shepherd's tongue had turned blue and she was fading fast. I now know the meaning of the word panic. I heard someone shouting "NO! NO! NO!" and only realised later that it was me. At one point I even contemplated breaking the Gordon's teeth when I happended to think of the tree pruning clipper which I'd used before to cut heavy wire. By the time I got back with it the shepherd had collapsed. I cut through one of the end rings and began to CLAW at the jagged edges to force the ring apart so it

could be slipped out and FINALLY, FINALLY the chain loosened!

There were a few terror stricken moments before when began to breathe and when she did it was erratic. There was blood on both dogs' coats but we discovered it had come from my own fingers which I's cut on the metal ring. Neither dog was seriously injured but we were all pretty shaken. I am still shaking.

In one shattering moment it became crystal clear to me what a fool - a LUCKY fool I'd been! Of course I'd heard that dogs can really CHOKE from choke chains, but I've used them for years on all my dogs without incident. Dear God. What if it had happened when I'd left the house for a few minutes or was in the shower? It only takes a few short minutes! Why do we think "It can't happen to ME"?

there will be no more choke collars from now on unless someone has a leash attached. At my house, at least. Please don't let this horror story happen to you before you wise up. You may not be as lucky as I was.

The tag on the collar warns you not to leave it on the dog while unattended. That's not good enough. My dogs WERE attended. I was watching them through a window! Thank God for that. It could happen other ways - a dog could jump up or run by a fence and snag the collar. Strangling dogs don't scream for help. I will never forget the look in my bitch's eyes before she passed out. PLEASE don't just think about it - take the collars of your dogs right NOW!

NOTE FROM THE EDITOR

Please let this story serve as a warning. Correction Chains should only be used when you are training or walking your dog. A fixed collar with their Registration Tag attached is much safer when your dog is unattended





ENGLISH SETTER

Height: 61 - 69 cm (24 - 27 inches) Weight: 25 - 30 kg (56 -66 lbs)

English Setters are large, long-coated dogs. They are white with black, blue, lemon, orange, or liver markings, and breeders prefer that the

marking be flecked uniformly throughout the entire body. The coat should be flat and silky. The chest, legs and tail should be moderately feathered. Setters and pointer were the only breeds exhibited at the first recorded dog show, at Newcastle-on-Tyne, England, in 1859.

English Setters are elegant enough to be heirs to a throne but so humble that it's obvious they consider themselves peasants. Neither miserable weather nor rough terrain deters them from flushing and retrieving game. Companions to English hunters for 400 years, this gentle setters owe their good looks to a devoted breeder named Edward Laverack and has dogs Ponto and Old Mill.

Like all of today's setters and spaniels, English Setters have feathery coats and sensitive noses. The coats come from flock guardians while the noses come from hounds, a combination first introduced to western Europe by the Celts. In the Middle Ages, these setting dogs were found frequently in the company of falconers.

An English Setter stalks game birds silently and points out their location with its tail.



WELSH CORGI (PEMBROKE)

Height: 25 - 31 cm (10 - 12 inches) Weight: 10 - 12.5 kg (20 - 26 lbs)

The Welsh Corgi (Pembroke) may be red, sable, black, or tan, with or without whit markings on the legs, chest or underparts,

and may have a blaze on the head. The dog has an extensive following in England and the United States, and in Australia it is one of the most popular breeds. The coat is medium length and double. The undercoat is dense, and weather resistant; the outer coat is somewhat longer and coarse.

Welsh tenant farmers wouldn't have served without Corgi to drive cattle to and from the Crown-owned lands on which the farmers pastured their herds. When the land was divided and sold to the farmers, canine cattle drivers lost their jobs. Only the diligence of devoted supporters kept the two breed of Corgi - the old Cardigan and the better known Pembroke - alive.

While one theory traces both breeds of Corgi back to Swedish Vallhunds that accompanied ninth-century Viking invaders, most people believe that breeds had different origins. Cardigans share ancestry with Dachshunds, while Pembrokes have spitz type forebears.

The little feet pitter-pattering through Buckingham Palace are likely to belong to a Pembroke Welsh Corgi. Riding royal coattails, Pembrokes have become one of the most popular breeds in Europe and Australia. Pembrokes in the palace are descended from Roseval Golden Eagle, a Corgi that King George VI, the gift he gave to his daughter, Elizabeth.





POWER PLAY

YOU DON'T NEED TO RULE WITH A ROD OF IRON IN ORDER TO BE BOSS IN YOUR OWN HOME

David Appleby looks at gently ways of regaining control (Reprinted from Dogs Today Aug/Sept 1993)

Significantly, most people bitten by dogs are bitten by their own pet or one well-know to them and this is one of the most common problems I see at my pet behaviour centre and regional clinics. But why does it happen?

Generally speaking, dogs live with people because we are very similar to them. Dogs are related to wolves which are co-operative hunters living in packs and working together to bring down large prey. The collective effort of the pack also extends to the communal feeding and raising of the young.

Man also developed as a co-operative hunter/gatherer who lived in extended family groups, not dissimilar to a wolf pack. Both structured on a basis of dominance and submission.

To maintain the status quo without the need to resort to violence, man and dog developed communication using body language, vocal and facial expression. To an extent our languages are similar. Okay, we haven't got pointed ears or tails, and dogs can't understand the meaning of words but the intonation of sounds can express moods that dogs recognise. Similarly, both species will draw themselves up to the full height if they are confident or cower away if they are being intimidated.

The closeness of the human canine relationship is compounded by the process of imprinting. Put simply, if you take a chick the moment it emerges from its shell and place it with sheep it will quickly become imprinted on the sheep and follow them to the exclusion of its own kind, because it thinks it is a sheep. The imprinting process for the dog takes somewhat longer, but if by 12 weeks of age or so a puppy has had no experience of people, it will never be able to relate to them. Similarly, if a puppy has no opportunity to intact with its own kind by 12 weeks it will be incapable of interacting with other dogs.

Normally, domestic dogs experience the company of other dogs and humans in the first few weeks of life and become imprinted on both, so they see dogs as dogs, and people as dogs too.

However, difficulties arise when we forget or ignore the canine perspective as a pack animal and treat dogs, unrealistically, as if they are Lassie or some Disney character. One of the possible consequences of this short-sightedness is that problems of dominance can occur.

THE CANINE PERSPECTIVE

Imagine for a moment you are a dog with a new bone. Would you give up your bone to another dog? Of course then you would seem to be weaker and lower in status. Remember, your dog perceives you as another dog, so if you are eating a piece of toast, and you hand some over to your dog you will be conveying a signal that can be interpreted as a submissive gesture. This inclines your dog to see you as a subordinate. This can also lead

to the dog trying to put you in your place in other circumstances.

Generally, the more socially climbing the dog, the fewer subordinate signals it needs. The worst cases can eventually result in someone being bitten. However, just about every dog has the capacity to develop problematical dominant behaviour, even if they are not innately inclined to be real leaders.

WHO'S BOSS

A dog's dominant demeanour does not necessarily result in aggression, in fact, in most cases it doesn't. Instead a dog's sense of high status can lead it to be reluctant to come when called and to obey other commands. It can result in an excessive level of attention-seeking behaviour, an over-developed tendency to defend territory and even excessive pulling on the lead, to name just a few.

Dogs that do develop dominance aggression may display it, for example, when the owners try to wipe their paws after a walk, when they are told to get off the furniture, when the owner ignores it to answer the telephone, when the owner gets out of the car first, or even when they put their coat on to go out. A dominant dog may also show aggression over items it has stolen, such as tissues or underwear, or when it's being stroked and has had enough. The list of ways in which a dominant dog may manifest its sense of high status is as extensive as the problem itself.

The crazy thing is with a little bit of thought and some understanding of the dog's way of looking at things we can prevent dominant behaviour. Think again about eating that piece of toast. If you don't hand any over you'll convey your higher status. This can be enhanced further if you say "Go away, it's mine!". There are many signals we can give our dogs to convey a more appropriate status - described at the bottom of this article.

BEST POLICY

Having read these guidelines, many readers may think "I've been doing the prohibited things all my life and I've never had a problem". Well, that may be, but it's about as useful as saying "I've been playing Russian Roulette all my life and the gun hasn't gone off yet". Give the wrong signals often enough and the chances are sooner or later the dog will get the wrong idea about its status and become a problem. Sadly, it's the dog who normally gets the blame and is either rehomed or euthanased, while the owners trot off to get another dog and repeat their mistakes all over again.

To prevent this sad state of affairs, the guidelines are an insurance against development of dominance aggression. Just like other forms of insurance you may not need them, but if you do, you are very relieved that you have been paying the premiums.

ASSERTING YOUR DOMINANCE

- Don't feed your dog food that you are eating only subordinates willingly give up their food.
- Always feed your dog after you have eaten dominant pack members always eat first.
- Don't let your dog into the bedrooms, preferable not upstairs at all regard these areas as your private den.

- Sometimes stand in your dog's bed and anywhere else he likes to lie you have the right to go anywhere.
- Don't let your dog on the furniture or on your lap the most dominant dogs occupy the higher levels.
- Groom your dog daily whether he needs it or not grooming who you want, when you want, reinforces dominance.
- Do not let your dog mouth or bite in play. Say NO sharply, then stop the game this teaches your dog that it should not use its teeth in play and how far to go in real life.
- Don't allow your dog to demand attention. Give him affection on your initiative. Call your dog to you, don't go to it dominant pack members tend to be aloof to unsolicited approaches made by subordinates.
- Make sure your dog gives way to you at doorways and gates dominate pack members precede subordinates.
- Don't step over or walk around your dog, make it move subordinates give way to dominant pack members.
- When walking your dog frequently change direction without warning this makes it clear that you are the pack leader and you determine the pace and direction of the walk.

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

Thank you must also go to those who attended the Working Bee to set up for the day.



OBEDIENCE TRAINING A Dog's View

If your owner doesn't already take you to Obedience Training get your "Dog appeal" working, or one of those things that makes your owner think that you might be better if you were more obedient. If you haven't been to an Obedience Club you haven't lived! You meet girls - or, if you are one, you are met by the boys.

Your owner comes to learn to be a "handler", ie the stooge that you have on the lead, or just standing around with you. the first thing, your handler learns is that if you run away, it doesn't matter what you do as long as you come back eventually, and sit down by her, you musn't be punished, because if you are punished you won't com - see? Remember this and you can Get Away with Murder. Always go back to your handler When You are ready, sit by her side, look up innocently - and just watch her blood pressure!



The tests as handlers think they should be done, will bore you to death, but with your Own Variation, you can play forever and score your own way!

Exercise 1. Heel on lead. A bit of a grind, hand your head and walk as slowly as you can: then without warning spring forward with all your might. If your handler falls flat on her face - you score 25 points.

Exercise 2. Heel Free. Anything goes, and so you go Usually at least one other dog will run with you: you will be able to run faster so you will never be caught, but You Can Catch, if you please. If you are outdoors, break off and attend to the wants of nature. This gives you an airtight alibi, and shows up your handler as an idiot who forgot to look after you before training started. You score 5 points for every minute of freedom.

Exercise 3. Recall. Handler walks off - let her go - but when she turns and shouts at you to come, assume rock deafness or show her how perfectly you can stay. Look anywhere you like But Not At Her! Later if you see anything worth investigating go and investigate. In YOUR own time return back to your handler, Preferably Cringing with your ears laid back. This will convince others handlers that yours is a secret dog beater and she will lose face. On no account sit in front of your handler as she will only make you move around her. Assume the "heel" Position right away and look with indifference. If handler loses her voice you score 25 points.

Exercise 4. Retrieve Dumbbell. Watch your handler throw away a wooden dumbbell with respectful interest. On No Account fetch it back, she will only throw it away again. If the silly so-and-so wants her bit of wood, let HER fetch it back - you will be helping train her not to throw things away that she really wants.

Variation: Run out to the dumbbell with enthusiasm, sniff it, smile at your handler, and smartly return to base without it - she can't hit you (see previous notes). Repeat as often as handler wishes: you score 5 points each time your handler retrieves the dumbbell.

OBEDIENCE TRAINING - A Dog's View


Exercise 5. Sit. On no account really sit. They always train you on wet and cold ground. The "Dobermann Squat" is quite good enough: you can sit ONE INCH from the ground at the back end. From this position you can spring away at your fastest speed without hesitation - 5 points for each successful squat.

Exercise 6. Down. Here you have to lie down. WITH PRACTICE, you can travel yards on your belly to reach other competitors. If they move, pretend you think the exercise is over and leave too. If you can remain out of handler's sight for 5 minutes. you score 30 points.

Conclusion: Without any warning, do any exercise you choose, PERFECTLY. This will leave your handler thinking that earlier mistake were her fault and the sucker will take you training week after week.

DO WHAT? WHEN? BY SANDRA G RICKEY

Do you really mean what you say to your dog? Think about it. It can make a difference in performance.

Too many of us fail to think what is is we actually want our dogs to do, when telling them to do it. How many times have you seen someone getting ready to leave, tell their dog, "Butch, come," as they walk off, and the dog moseys along behind them. Two weeks later they're in the obedience ring and the same command, "Butch, come," is given, only this time if Butch doesn't snap to and sit directly in front, Butch is in trouble. The same person may tell his dog, as he leaves him in the car or home, to "stay," but doesn't really mean for Butch to remain almost motionless in whatever position he's in when the command is given. Another example is "down/drop" when all the person wants is for his dog to go lay comfortably on his rug, not "hit the floor and wait for further instructions".

Most dogs learn, after a while, to distinguish between what we say and what we mean. Perhaps they pick up on our body language, (if master stands stiff and straight, with a nervous look on his face, "come" means straight in and sit in front. If he's walking along casually he just desires my company.) But think how confusing this could be to a dog just starting to learn obedience commands, (sometimes "stay" means don't budge, and other times it means remain in the house until my owner returns.)

It's to our own advantage to give our dogs every advantage possible when teaching them, the clearer we make our commands and signals, the less time it takes to train. I've found that by suing "you wait heres" instead of "stay". my dogs pick up very quickly that they're to remain in that area, house, car, yard, with a friend, etc., but can move around. Whereas, "stay" means to remain in the position they're in. It's a little like boundary training as they know they're not to go out an open yard gate, or car door, even though they can go anywhere inside that area they wish. For just going for a walk, I use something like "okay", or "let's go", but never the formal recall command, unless that's what I really want from the dog. My dogs know that "go lay down," means go to your place and sleep, while "down/drop" means drop instantly and keep alert, we might do something else.

These seem like very basic things, but it's surprising how many of us forget the basics. So remember, say what you really mean and make it easier on your dog and, therefore easier on yourself. WATCH YOUR TONGUE!
