

May God continue to bless you with all those annoying things - and don't sweat the small stuff.





Noisy dog?

Get control now - Vicki deGruy


Q: My dog barks all the time. He barks at the mailman, at sounds he hears on TV, at birds outside the window, whenever the doorbell rings, whenever he wants something. He never seems to shut up. I've tried yelling at him, squirting lemon juice in his mouth and tossing a "throw can" like my obedience instructor said. Nothing seems to work. He's driving me crazy! What can I do?

A: Barking can be, quite honestly, a hard behaviour to modify because it's a self-rewarding activity for the dog. When a dog barks, he almost always makes something happen. When he barks at the mailman, for example, the mailman leaves. (The dog doesn't know that dropping off the mail and walking away is the mailman's job — he thinks his barking has scared the 'intruder' off.)

When the doorbell rings, he barks to let you know that something is out there ... and sure enough,

you come to see. If he barks for his dinner, you usually bring it to him. Yelling, scolding or throwing things are seldom effective as corrections because he's still making something happen with his barking even if that something isn't very nice. A better way to hush your noisy dog is to teach him to start — and stop — barking on command.

First, train your dog to "Speak!" for a dog cookie. Praise him when he barks. After a few woofs, tell him "alright, Enough!" in a firm, no nonsense voice. Immediately pop the cookie into his mouth. It's impossible for him to bark when his mouth is stuffed with cookie so he has no choice except to obey your command to stop barking. Now tell him what a good dog he is for being quiet.



With a dog as noisy as yours, you can use all his barking episodes as training opportunities. When the doorbell rings, praise him for barking to alert you, then tell him "Enough!" and reward with a treat when he stops. He's going to learn that you want a few woofs and then silence. Make sure you praise him for barking when he's supposed to and then stopping (Enough!) on command.

When you know that he fully understands the meaning of the word "Enough," you can start correcting him when he ignores it. If he doesn't obey your command to stop barking, give him a sharp tug on his collar and scold "NO! Enough!" Before long, you'll be able to use "Enough" to stop him before he starts to bark.

This training is going to take a few weeks to sink in. Be persistent and don't give up. Some breeds are naturally noisy and will take more work to train than others. Even when your dog understands what's expected of him, he may still bark more often than you'd like him to. Now, though, you have a way of getting his attention and letting him know what you want. Even if you have to say "Enough!" each time he barks when he's not supposed to, you'll be doing much better than when you didn't have a way to communicate with him at all.

Q: My dog lives outside and barks almost constantly. The neighbours are complaining and they've called the police once. If I can't get her to stop, I'm going to have to give her away. Would one of those bark collars help?

A: It might but there's a good chance it won't be a permanent cure. Dogs are social creatures; nature didn't intend for them to live by themselves isolated from their families. Dogs that live outdoors are often lonely and bored. They bark for attention and for something to do. A bark collar might silence her temporarily but if you don't take care of her needs for company and exercise, she'll learn to ignore the collar and continue barking. For a long-term solution, bring her inside and make her a genuine part of your family.


Introduction

- ♥ Sassy and Michelle play tug-of-war with Michelle's socks, Sassy growling her puppy growls and Michelle yelling at the puppy for tearing the cotton with her needle-sharp teeth. Sassy is a three-month-old Airedale Terrier.
- ♥ Tiger is still peeing in the corner, even after he's been outside to relieve himself. Tiger is a five-month-old Chow Chow mix.
- ♥ Misty chases Sean and Traci and grabs their pant legs. Last week Traci fell and banged up her knee and Sean smacked the puppy for chasing his sister. Misty is a four-month-old Shetland Sheepdog.
- Dixie takes her owner for a drag every morning and sometimes darts out the door for a romp on her own. Dixie is a six-month-old Labrador Retriever

Sassy, Tiger, Misty, and Dixie are prime candidates for surrender to an animal shelter.

Dog tales

The first six months after puppy comes home are critical in shaping the relationship between puppy and family. Lapses and mistakes here can take months to fix, and families often do not have the time, persistence, or inclination to repair companionship-gone-wrong. Thus a trip to the shelter or rescue group with a tale of woe and a plea to find this "good dog but he . . . " a new home, a trip often followed a week or month or year later with purchase or adoption of another dog and a new beginning on the same path.



Much of the early problems in puppy training occur because of the persistence of an old belief that dogs are not ready for training until they are six months old.

Wrong!

Puppies are ready to learn when they are born. Training merely formalizes the learning so that the family and the puppy can get along and build a bond that lasts a lifetime. The trick is to teach appropriate behaviours and squelch inappropriate behaviours so that Sassy or Tiger becomes the dog of your dreams — faithful, well mannered, playful, obedient, a joy to live with and brag about.

New puppies

New puppy care is relatively easy if tiring. Just get the little guy outside to relieve himself, feed him three times a day, and put him in the crate to sleep. He doesn't really need a leash because he can't run fast enough to get away, he's fun to play with because he'll chase the ball and act ferocious, he's ready to lick your face at a moment's notice, and he's sooooo cute when he's asleep.

Christmas puppies reach the terrible **three-month** stage about the end of January, and then the troubles begin. At three months, most puppies can run faster than most kids and many adults. And they are beginning to assert some independence that may translate to growling if a toddler approaches the food bowl or a grade school youngster tries to retrieve a stolen action figure. By **four months**, the pooch is agile enough to slip out the door when the kids come home from school and big enough to knock a nine-year-old on his backside. He may also be bold enough to steal snacks from tiny hands or from the table.

By **five months**, a big-breed puppy is large enough and strong enough to drag even older kids and small adults — if they are lucky enough or foolish enough to clip a leash to the collar.

By six months, the pup may have destroyed the furniture in his teething frenzy, eaten a dozen pairs of socks, ruined bedspreads and stuffed toys and carpets, and required a couple of trips to the vet for intestinal upsets caused by his destructive activities. By this time, the kids may be afraid of the

growing pup, Mom may be disgusted with his antics, and Dad may be ready to ship him out as an economic measure.

All this trouble can be avoided if the pup is trained from the moment he arrives in the home. And it can become a thing of the past if appropriate remedies are applied. In other words, those Christmas puppies can be well on the way to becoming loyal, affectionate, and obedient family pets by Easter with a modicum of persistence, a change in focus, and a determination to save the relationship.

Control

The best control over the dog and family relationship is the selection of an appropriate breed or mix for the family character and circumstances. Active families will be happier with active dogs; neat families will be happier with dogs that don't shed and drool; and quiet, shy families will be happier with mild-mannered breeds that need only moderate exercise. However, if a mistake has been made in the selection of a breed, all is not lost. With flexibility and determination, there's no need to give the pet away or to doom him to the backyard or the animal shelter. It is up to the adults in the family to exert control over the relationship with the puppy. Control is physical and mental.

Physical control involves guiding the puppy to do the right thing or placing him in a position to do the right thing. It does not mean spanking him with a hand or object when he makes a mistake. Mental control means developing a relationship with the puppy that clearly places you in the role of leader. If you have mental control, the puppy looks to you for approval and obeys your commands. Control is established in a number of ways.

- * With a leash and collar: Even if Sassy couldn't possible run fast enough to escape, she should learn to wear a collar and leash when she is less than three months old. If she pulls on the leash, you can change direction and coax her to follow you. Make it a game. Let her chase you; if she's a pant leg-grabber, distract her with a toy or treat. Don't drag her around; make it fun to be with you and she'll learn quickly.
- * With food: Feed Tiger at least twice a day. Teach him to sit before you put the bowl on the floor by holding it above his head. When he tips his head to look up, his haunches will hit the floor. Praise him and quickly put the bowl down. If he stands up too soon, have someone hold him gently in sitting position while you put the bowl down. Treats are great training aids for puppies. Just make sure that Tiger obeys a command before getting his treat.
- * With a crate: Crates are dog rooms, not dog prisons. They are safe havens for a tired or sick puppy and a necessity for putting puppy out of harm's way. Crates protect furniture and carpets

- from puppy damage when you are not home. And crates are great relievers of frustration when Misty is running amok and the kids are screaming that she stole their cookies and you just discovered a pile of faeces in the corner, it's great to send her to her room until she calms down and you get things under control.
- * With companionship: A dog that travels with its family is a dog that has good manners out of necessity. And a well-mannered dog is a joy to take along on trips to the kids' soccer game or the park or a family picnic or even a vacation. On the other hand, a dog that is banished to the back yard or the garage because it is ill mannered generally becomes more so out of boredom and loneliness.
- * With formal training: Obedience training has lost its mystique in recent years. No longer the sole province of Hollywood trainers and show competitors, obedience training has been modernised and adapted for family pets. Dog training schools and business exist in just about every nook and cranny of the country. Kennel clubs and breed clubs offer assistance to pet owners and provide literature about selecting a breed and breeder and training a puppy at hundreds of dog shows throughout the country. Many animal shelters offer counselling services and obedience classes to help prevent or solve problems so that families can develop a solid relationship with their pets. And dozens of books are available to help owners understand puppy behaviour and train pets at home.
- * By spay or neuter surgery: Dogs that are spayed or neutered tend to be less aggressive and to stay at home. They also tend to be healthier.

Keep the dog you have


When the bond between man and pet fails to blossom or breaks down, dogs frequently end up in an animal shelter. Many young dogs surrendered to shelters are euthanised because they have behaviour problems that need never have developed. They are runaways or chewers or nippers or growlers or barkers or domineering or fearful or just plain difficult to control. Sometimes families that can deal with the behaviours adopt them, but often they are returned to the shelter because the new owners are as frustrated as those who surrendered the pooch in the first place. And most often, these dogs are euthanised before they get a chance at a new home.

The trick to keeping dogs out of shelters is to prevent bad behaviours from developing and to train away bad behaviours that have formed. The first six months are crucial to achieve that end.

You may be interested in how I assist Mrs Robinson in her day-to-day life. I am trained to detect


a smoke alarm an alarm clock a door buzzer or bell a ringing telephone a knock at the door

DOG BREEDS FROM A TO Z


German Wirehaired Pointer

The German Wirehair Pointer originated in Germany in the early 1900. In their homeland they are called Deutsch Drahthaar, they are one of the same breed. Translated Deutsch = German, Draht = Wire and Haar = hair. The term pointer was added. It was produced by hunters who wanted a dog with the abilities of a pointer but with a wire coat that would give protection in weather, damage by thorns and bushes.

The Wirehair is a medium sized dog but one of the largest of the pointing breeds. The most identifying feature is the coat and furnishings on the head. The general impression is of a gruff old man.


The typical Wirehair puppy is full of endless energy, he is extremely inquisitive, affectionate and always ready for patting and play. The breed often displays Germanic stubbornness which can be very frustrating to the novice. They do not respond to harsh training and will bite with brutal treatment. For best results repetition, firmness and plenty of praise. A firm confident handler is best.

Supervision should always be taken with any big dog around children. Pups can knock down a child under 5 years very easily. The Wirehair is very protective and devoted to it's owner and family, they make very good watch dogs.



They are not aggressive towards people but can be possessive of their owner's. They are reserved and aloof with strangers.

Wanting to please is their strong point. They have a clown like attitude and can be active. The Wirehair likes to be near it's human companion and does not always make a good kennel dog, kenneled exclusively they become antisocial. They need "couch time" even if it is just of an evening. These dogs for whom



"socialization" is a critical training technique. Being a pet does not detract them from hunting. The hunting is natural in this breed. Bringing the best hunting ability cois up to the correct training given.

I do not generally recommend them to the average pet owner, as the Wirehair becomes very bored with the suburban backyard. They need to be worked or have some form of entertainment such as obedience or agility. Any kept as a pet should be walked on a leash at least twice daily for stimulation. I have not found them suitable with cats or chickens although some people have had success. They have very active minds and if there is nothing to entertain them they will make their own at your expense.

To sum it up the Wirehair is the most devoted friend you will ever have, it is not a silly, tail wagging, kissing dog, but a highly intelligent, proud and sometimes funny creature that can put it all together.



Griffon Bruxellios

Originally used to catch rats in stables where hansom cabs were kept, this sturdy dog makes a great companion.

The Brussels Griffon (or Griffon Bruxellois) was developed in the 1800s by the artisans and cab drivers of Brussels who crossed the Griffon with English Toy Terriers. They are mostly popular in their native Belgium, only coming to the attention of Americans and Canadians before the First World War. They are not profuse in numbers as they are difficult to breed successfully, often having only one pup in a litter and a high mortality rate in their first few weeks.

A rather fierce-looking little dog with features that are described as almost human by some, or more monkey-like by its detractors. Height: not specified, but usually around 10 - 12 in (25 - 30 cm). Weight: 5 - 11 ll



The head of the Brussels Griffon is large, rounded, and broad between the ears. The muzzle is wide and the nose is short, black, and has large open nostrils. The eyes are large and round, dark, and set wide apart. The ears are small

and set high in a semi-erect pose. The body is short with well-sprung ribs and a short, strong loin. The tail is carried high and is docked. The forequarters are straight and solid. The hindquarters are muscular in the thighs.

There are two coat types in the Brussels Griffon: a rough and wiry coat and a short, smooth coat. The two coat types can appear in the same litter due to the number of Terrier types combined in this breed and the unstable genes: The coat color can be black, rust, black and tan, black and rust, tan, or red. In the red dogs, darker shading on the face and ears is a feature.

The Brussels Griffon is a most delightful little dog. This dog can develop a highly individual character and really charm its owner. As this dog has such a cute appearance people sometimes inadvertently allow it to become very bossy. It is wise to be assertive with this little dog as it matures, or else it will please itself, rather than its appearance. This does not be a second of the plant of the plant

else it will please itself, rather than its owner. This dog should be given lots of simple tasks to carry out and rewarded with showers of praise from its owner. The Brussels Griffon will make a very good watch-dog if it is clearly shown what it should respond to. A wonderful companion animal.





CANINE ETIQUETTE


All members should be aware of the need for canine social skills before, during and after Class. Your dogs are your responsibility and canine etiquette and lifestyle skills are just another part of the learning process.

Don't make the mistake of assuming that because in your eyes, your canine companion is the most sociable creature going, that all dogs are the same. Or, that your sweet social companion is really the angel you imagine. By observing the social skills below your four-legged friend will become the welcome visitor, instead of the one you wish to avoid.



- Not all dogs like the "in your face" attitude of other dogs. Having another dog bound at them face on and putting paws on the back are considered very bad manners in dog terms and usually result in an angry response, particularly from a more mature dog. Sadly, it is often the mature dog that is labelled an angry dog and one to be avoided, when all he/she is really saying is "where are your manners?"
- Not all dogs like their space invaded and some don't like the space of their handler invaded either, as they often feel the need to be protective, again resulting in an angry response.
- "Eye-balling" (the fixed stare) is also unacceptable behaviour, as this is seen as a challenge in dog terms and particularly if one or both dogs tense their body, raise up on their toes and generally make themselves look more threatening. Unless you are constantly aware of your dog's behaviour these early signals can go unnoticed, resulting in two dogs lunging at each other. By being vigilant you can avoid these situations by turning your dog away, breaking the eye contact and giving him/her something to do like a sit, drop or stand and then rewarding for the attention he/she has paid to you.
- If you would like your dog to meet another dog, sit your dog beside you and ask the handler if it is okay, before releasing your dog to play. If the answer is "No" please respect the owners decision as there is probably a very good reason, which may not be obvious.
- Do not allow your dog to approach a dog that is tied up and unattended.
- If you are talking, always be aware of what your dog is doing at the end of the lead. Often we become so involved in our own social activity that we forget that our four-legged friend has his or her own social activity.
