RALLY OBEDIENCE HAS TAKEN GEELONG BY STORM By Wendy Ganly

On July 14th & 15th, 2012 the Trial Secretary, Janelle Convery and her band of helpers of the Geelong Obedience Dog Club did an amazing job during the two days to complete two Obedience and four Rally Obedience trials. Equipment, food stuff, drinks etc., had to be taken to the new site after the trial was transferred to another area. The number of entries was phenominal. All involved in Rally never ever thought that the numbers would be so high. A lot was learnt over the weekend.

Five rings were set up for the two days with judges, stewards and the many handlers with their dogs. The ground was a bit wet underfoot but we were blessed to have nice weather for the two days. with the exception of the last class of the Sunday being the Advanced Rally Obedience, judged by Graham Eades in the rain. A total of 15 or 16 Geelong handlers and their dogs entered the four rally trials, 2 on Saturday and 2 on Sunday.

My oh My, what a result. Each and every one of them performed brilliantly by gaining passes. Most of the passes led to the girls gaining their Rally Obedience Novice Titles (RN, these letters are to follow their pedigree names along with whatever other titles they have gained). Janelle and her two Goldens and my Aussie Shepherd gained their Advanced Titles. Janelle and Trish finished up with an amazing booty by winning the rings. Me, well, all I can say is "Wow" as Gambit was able to be placed as the Highest Geelong Member on the Sunday with a score of 96.

To enter a Rally Obedience trial a person and their dog/s must be registered with the Victorian Canine Association/Vic Dogs. The owner and dog are given Registration numbers. These numbers are required for a lot of VCA activities.

There are three levels of Rally O - Novice, Advanced & Excellent. Each handler has to first enter Novice, gain three passes under two different judges, send off an application to the VCA for the dogs title along with it's pedigree certificate.

The handler has to follow a course made up of between 12 - 20 signs taken from the rally list of exercises numbered from 1 to 50 depending on what level. Each level is a bit harder than the one before.

The Washing Machine exercise had a number of Advanced class members stumped as well as the Stand from a sit along with the Off-set figure 8 with cheese in two containers that the dog is supposed to just heel past LOL. The classes are run from 10.15am - 12.something pm on Sunday mornings. Come over to the back paddock and have a look at what it is all about. I'm sure you'll want to have a go.

There is a waiting list and you will need your instructor to sign a form allowing you to join the Novice Class.

Games Dogs Love that will make both of you happier

There are many reasons to play games with your dog. It will strengthen your relationship. It will keep the dog from getting bored, which will keep him from things you don't want him doing, and make him healthier. Many of the games described here will actually help train your dog. It's important that you can establish control of your dog even when he's very excited. And finally, most people get a dog for companionship -- isn't playing with your dog the whole point? One thing to keep in mind is your attitude while playing. Most dogs will have fun if it's clear you're having fun, too.

Games as Rewards

Remember that any activity that your dog likes but which you control can be used as a reward for good behaviour. Use a favourite game like tug or fetch to reward recalls, long stays and exemplary bouts of loose-leash walking!


Hide and Go Seek

When you are out of sight of your dog, call her to you. You can either use your normal "recall" command or just her name. Be very excited when she arrives. Start making it more difficult by "hiding" behind doors, couches, etc. If she doesn't find you at first, call her again. If your dog is

very good at "stay" you can use this to keep her in place while you hide. Some dogs will use their noses for this task, others will just look. Most of them will learn a faster recall. This is a great game for kids to play with dogs, as long as the kids don't encourage the dog to chase them. (I played this for hours with my first dog when I was young!)

Treasure Hunt

Put your dog in a down-stay and place a treat (food or toy) within sight. Return to your dog and release her, and encourage her to go to the treat -- she can eat it or play with it. Repeat this, varying where you put the treat. Next time, "hide" the treat where the dog can't see it, but she can see you putting it there (behind a piece of furniture, for example).



Release her, and let her get the treat (show her if necessary). Next, hide the treat in further away, then in another room, out of sight, and if she stays in her "stay" let her find it. You can increase the distance, difficulty, and even number of treats (several small food bits) as your dog gets better at "stay". This is especially good for dogs that have begun to learn "stay" but are nervous about having their people go out of sight. (Thanks to Janet A. Smith for this one!)

Clean Up Your Toys

Get a box or bucket and collect a number of toys and other dog-safe items (don't start with things your dog likes to hoard or that you don't want them *ever* touching). Scatter the toys in a small pile on the floor. Through shaping and teasing, get the dog to pick up the items one at a time, and place them in your hand. Once the dog is lifting the items high enough to get your hand underneath to receive, you are well started. Be sure to reward each "gift" with a food treat. Make it harder and harder to put stuff in your hand, while maintaining the fun of this "return for refund" game. Each item retrieved is dumped into the bucket. The dog will leave harder ones for later, so over time make substitutions that make the items increasingly difficult for the dog. Some dogs take the leap and start putting things directly into the bucket themselves. (Thanks to Diana Hilliard for this one!)

Simon Says

If you have the right attitude, you can make obedience training a game. Let your dog prove how clever she or he is by sitting when you say, "sit", lying down when you say "down", etc. Try it when your eyes are closed, your back is to the dog, or you are in a different position like lying down or even standing on your head! Mix up "drop it", "take it/get it", "hold it", and "leave it".

Fetch

Some dogs are natural fetchers, others are not. All can learn to enjoy this game. Be sure to teach and practice "drop it" first. If your dog refuses to return the ball (and this is pretty instinctive!), or drops it too far away, end the game in disgust. Don't turn "fetch" into "keep away"! "Fetch" can be shaped by rewarding interest in a toy, then approaching a toy, then touching it, then mouthing it, then picking it up. Use a clicker to click-and-treat faster retrieves, catches in the air, or a neater return.

Tug of War

The secret to playing this game successfully is for you, the human, to control it. For this game, choose one particular toy that will be used as your tug rope (don't use one of your socks, or food items, or the leash!). Never play tug with any other toy. You start the game by picking up the toy and encouraging your dog to also pick it up. Give a particular cue that the game has started, like "Let's tug!".

Some dogs will refuse to do this with you, especially if they've been punished for tugging in the past. You can start small by clicking and treating them for holding one end while you hold the other. However, tugging is instinctive for dogs (it's a cooperative act in packmate feeding) so your dog should catch on

quickly. Tug a few times, then tell your dog "drop it". (You can use the same cheerful tone of voice you use for "sit" or "come"). You can reward him for dropping it with either a treat or another round of tug (preceded by "Let's tug!").

Make sure that you end the game if your dog gets too rough or agitated. Simply ask for "drop it", praise for it, and put the toy away. If the dog refuses to let go, you let go of your end and walk away (it takes two to tug). Don't try to take the toy back because that will be starting the game over. Ignore the dog if she or he tries to start the game. Wait until she or he has stopped bugging you and is doing something your want to reward (even if



that's lying quietly). Practice Tug - Drop it - Tug - Drop it. If the dog starts anticipating and grabs the toy, drop your end and leave in disgust. You decide when the game is over; reward the last "drop it" and then put the toy away where the dog can't get it.

Some books will warn against this because of the fear that the dog will try to establish dominance, or that the dog will refuse to drop other items. Dogs and wolves do not try to establish dominance through tug-of-war games, and the fact that **you** start and stop it the game at **your** will maintains your "dominance". If your dog has a problem with guarding items or refuses to drop things, work on that first. One way to train "drop it" is to give the dog a large item to hold, then offer a very desirable treat in exchange. Be patient -- don't try to chase the dog around, offering the treat (why should the dog take food from you when getting chased by you is so much fun? See "Keep Away", below). When the dog goes for the treat, click as soon as the toy is dropped and give the treat. Don't grab for the toy yourself. If the dog picks it up again, try another exchange. When the dog is dropping the toy regularly, start giving the cue "drop it" before each treat offer.

Keep Away

Like tug-of-war, this is a fun game your dog will enjoy while you continue to establish control. Again, choose **one** item. Give it to your dog and give some cue like "keep away!" (Jean Donaldson and I use "I'm gonna GET ya!"). It helps to use consistent body language, too -- exaggerated stalking or reaching pose. Chase your dog, repeating your cue. End with an "OK, good dog!" and then ignore any of her or his attempts to get the game started again. Remember, **you** start the game and you end it.

Make Your Dog Welcome

I would guess that if you have a dog, you love your dog (otherwise why would you have him?). And, because you love your dog, you like to take him with you on family outings, festivals, walkathons, or other places which may allow dogs to be present. If you want your dog to be able to accompany you, you must give him the skills necessary to be kept under control and not be a safety hazard.

It is so extremely EASY to give your dog a few basic manners, so that he will be welcomed into public places. Yet, many people think that teaching ordinary control exercises are beyond their capabilities. Or, they think that obedience training is just for people who want to make a career out of it, or something.

Teaching your dog some basic manners is all common-sense stuff. You did it with your children (if you had children), and your parents did it with you. If you would have been left to your own devices and never learned right from wrong, imagine what kind of person you'd be. Yet, some people expect to raise their dogs without any "coaching" on the matter of acceptable vs. unacceptable behaviors. Your dog needs even more coaching and "parental guidance" from you, since his social background is completely different from yours. He has much more to learn. The nature of his canine upbringing automatically makes him a "delinquent" by human standards.

Accentuate the Positive

Look for GOOD behaviors and reward them. So often, we don't notice that our dog is doing ANYTHING until he is doing something BAD. Then, the screaming starts. The dog gets all kinds of attention for his misdeed, and he's thinking this is a really good way to get people to notice him. Instead, start looking for the ABSENCE of the bad behavior or the opposite of the bad behavior. If the dog is annoying you with nuisance barking, reward his silence with your praise and attention. If the dog jumps up on you to greet you and you want him to stop, reward only sitting greetings (or with all four feet on the floor) with your praise and attention.

Example: One time I had a man bring a "whiney" Labrador Retriever to the first night of my obedience class. The dog whined and barked almost continuously, and the man asked what he could do to make him stop. I'm sure he expected my answer to be some form of punishment to nip the behavior in the bud. I simply told the guy to wait until the dog went several seconds without whining or barking and to reward the silence with attention, praise and treats. Within 20 minutes, the man remarked at how unbelievable the transformation was. By the end of class the Lab was quiet as a clam, and the man thought that I was the world's best dog trainer!

Eliminate the Negative

When the dog does something you don't like, stifle your urge to react to the incident. Ignore the bad behaviors, and they will usually go away by themselves. There is no need to persist in a behavior that is not "working" in some way to gain the dog some advantage. If your dog jumps up to greet you, and you ignore him and turn away, he will try another behavior to gain your attention (like keeping his feet on the ground). Make sure you reward the more acceptable behavior when it is offered. If the dog is bored, and the behavior is self-rewarding (like barking, garbage raiding and digging), you will need to work very diligently on "rewarding the absence of the behavior" side of the equation, and on managing the dog's environment a little better.

Example: When your dog lives in relative solitary confinement, any event or change in his environment is exciting for him. Ted Turner, a whale trainer at Sea World says that when the animals are bad, the trainers must steel themselves to remain totally neutral to the event. If the trainer tried to "punish" the whale by grabbing his bucket of fish and stomping off, it would serve to amuse the animal and therefore reinforce him. Ignoring a behavior gives it zero reinforcement value.

Manage the environment.

Minimize the dog's potential for getting into trouble by removing "dog magnets" from the environment (don't leave things out for him to get into or chew up). Control the Reinforcement Value of everything in your dog's life. Everything that could be a possible reward to your dog should be strictly controlled. You want to increase the reinforcement value of rewards and interaction with you. You want to decrease the reinforcement value of squirrels, food left too close to the edge of the table, and shred able items of your personal possession. To reduce the reinforcement value, make the items impossible to attain. Move them as far away from your dog as possible. Make the possibility of earning one of them less than remote. To increase a reinforcement value of his treats, toys, and playing with you, make these something that is more likely to be attainable.

Example: If your dog's greatest desire is to chase pigeons, then don't practice his training sessions in the park next to the pigeons. The reinforcement value of possibly getting to pounce on pigeons is far too great for you to expect him to give you his attention. Distance him from the thing he wants. This will make it less attainable. Let him see that the chance of receiving the reward of a nice piece of liver (and your attention) is far more eminent. In other words, your dog may see eating liver and playing with you as an "eight" on a scale of one to ten. Pigeons, however, are a "nine." If you want to possibly get through to your dog with any training, you must reduce the reinforcement value of the pigeons. If you can make them a "seven" by moving them out of reachable range, then your liver treats will win out, and you will have your dog's attention, and find that "teachable moment."

Put it to use today!

These basic training principles work the same on spouses, kids, and employees. Put yourself in your dog's "shoes." Do you work better for praise and attention, or for punishment and being ignored? Many bosses and parents miss the boat by not paying attention to these simple fundamentals. I had a job with a large company 20 years ago. I worked from day to day with a boss who only seemed to notice mistakes and not successes. I was loaned to another department one time, and worked under the supervision of a different person. At the end of the first day, my temporary boss took me aside and told me what a great job I had done, and named several specific things that she liked about my work. I don't know if she was telling the truth, or if it was her standard operating procedure, but guess what kind of work I did the next day, and the next? I would have just about killed myself trying to work harder for this person, because she appreciated my effort and positively reinforced it. What do you think my attitude would have been on subsequent days if she would have found fault with my work?

If you follow these three simple guidelines, you will see a behavior change in your dog. You will notice an increase in good behaviors and a decrease in bad ones, without even having to teach your dog any obedience commands. Remember that you are in control of the situation. If you notice your dog has developed a behavior that annoys you, ask yourself what the reward history of that behavior was. Make sure the behavior stops being rewarded, and replace it with a more acceptable behavior which you will reward each time you see it in the absence of the other behavior. It's amazing how many bad behaviors develop in dogs whose owners don't even realize that they are reinforcing the bad habits with their attention, when they should be rewarding the opposite thing instead.

When your dog develops a set of "manners," he will be a joy to own, and no problem to take with you in public. We do recommend basic obedience exercises (teaching your dog to come when called, walk on a loose leash and stay when told). See the pages on basic training for more information.

Train yourself to "wake up" and notice the "good stuff." Reward it when you see it. Keep everything positive. Remember that it works on dogs, children, spouses and employees. Positive reinforcement works on every organism that has a brain. www.DogScouts.com
